We've Relocated...Again



Meeting closing remarks:



GPS Units Now The Norm In Helping Metal Detectorists



e it used for camping, hiking, or Geocaching with family and friends, hand-held portable GPS units are indispensible for those trips out into the field. The ability to mark your starting location, take off into unfamiliar terrain and return to your starting position is a simple operation. Geocachers have long used the GPS devices to locate caches hidden by coordinates. No digging is required in Geocaching as all targets are hidden only by natural foliage or ground cover.

Metal Detectorists have also found the devices to offer several advantages when out hunting. Not only can your start and return trip be mapped out, but while hunting a large area, you have the ability to later look at your tracks and

see areas that may have been missed. Locations of finds can also be recorded and used to plot the boundaries of old home sites or other possible areas of past habitation. As with all electronic devices, one should have a thorough understanding of the unit's operation before depending on it in what could escalate into an emergency, such as being lost and not knowing how to follow the GPS unit back to your camp site or other hunting companions.



As always, be safe. Carry water, a snack, a small first-aid kit, and extra batteries for both your detector and GPS unit.

Purple Paint Means "No Trespassing"

If you've been out traveling the county roads, you may have come across a tree like the photo on the right. Simply put, DO NOT ENTER THIS AREA! This is equivalent to a "Posted" sign.

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Member Robert Underwood discussed his recent display of historic and relic items recovered from Rockingham County loaned through the month of May to the downtown Reidsville, NC public library. The display was titled, "Artifacts of Early American Homesites in Rockingham County, NC".

A long time metal detectorist, coin shooter, relic hunter, researcher, and historian, Robert showed items recovered from several local plantations as well as old home sites since destroyed by development in the Rockingham County area. Items dated from the French and Indian War period to U.S. issue military buttons of 1918.
